### **Pre-reading Skill Practice-at-Home for**

### **Rhyme Awareness**



<u>Kindergarten-Ready:</u> The ability to recognize and produce rhyming words is an important pre-reading skill and predicts later reading development. Rhyming is important for *phonological awareness*, which is the ability to hear and identify the various sounds in spoken words. Kids entering Kindergarten should have awareness of rhyme through practice and repetition of the skill. *The most important thing you can do for your child's early education success is to introduce them to books and read to them at home before they start school.* 

#### **Practice-at-Home Activities:**

- Remind your child that rhyming words make the same sound at the end. Say, "Listen, f---ox, b---ox. They sound alike. Their last parts are the same in my mouth. F--ox, b--ox." Give examples: 'cat' and 'hat' rhyme; 'mop' and 'top' rhyme.
- Each day, find an item in the environment and have your child say words that rhyme. For example: "There's a dog! What are some words that rhyme with dog?"
- Help your child do rhyming worksheets. Students may need help identifying pictures on worksheets.
- Read nursery rhymes and rhyming books with your child. A rhyming book list is below, and all can be reserved at the library.
